





In his writing, the Celtic poet, John O'Donohue, warns us that "While we seem to have progressed to become experts in so many things—multiplying and acquiring stuff we neither need nor truly want—we have unlearned the grace of presence and belonging." He goes on to advise, "With the demise of religion, many people are left stranded in a chasm of emptiness and doubt; without rituals to recognize, celebrate, or negotiate the vital thresholds of people's lives. The key crossings pass by, undistinguished from the mundane, everyday rituals of life... If we approach our decisive thresholds with reverence and attention, the crossing will bring us more than we could ever have hoped for." (*To Bless the Space Between Us*, O'Donohue, 2008).

This notion of approaching decisive thresholds with reverence and attention is the theme of the upcoming *Journey Series* session. *Tools for the Journey: Expanding Awareness through Meditation and Mottos* will present five essential messages, based on Allin's professional musings about healthy and purposeful living, accompanied by compelling stories, participants' reflections, and intermittent meditations, music, and silence. Storytellers include: **Dr. Dan Woodliff, Dr. Bob Blacklock, Dr. Keith Mansel**, and **Rev. Buddy Stallings**. Bring a journal and pen.

March 5 \rightarrow I arrived home around three a.m. Not surprisingly, I slept late into the morning. In the afternoon, I worked out and did laundry.

March 6 \rightarrow I had a busy day playing 'catchup' in the office. The morning included several staff meetings. The afternoon included meetings with several church leaders from the diocese.

March 7 \rightarrow Most of the morning was spent getting ready for the afternoon meeting of the Executive Committee. The meeting went well. The Rev. Will Compton was elected Vice-President. I had two online meetings that lasted into the evening.

March 15 \rightarrow After a workout, I proceeded to the office for my normal meeting with Andy Andrews and later Peggy Jones. Over the lunch hour, I met with the Commission on Ministry.

March 16 → I joined the Standing Committee for a portion of their quarterly Zoom meeting. After lunch, I worked out and later in the day I drove to the Coast for

evening meetings with St. Patrick's in Long Beach. My meeting included remodeling to their buildings thanks to a new partnership with the Mississippi School for the Blind. This new ministry promises to offer a unique Spirit to the congregation.

March 17 \rightarrow I officiated at St. Patrick's principal service and confirmed two and received one. I decided to take a little break from driving and spent an additional night on the Coast.

March 18 \rightarrow After driving home from the Coast, I managed time to get a workout at the GRIT pool.

March 19 → After staff meetings, I was busy with phone

calls and emails for most of the day. Before heading home, I began the task of packing my office.

March 20 \rightarrow I spent the morning at the Capitol with judicatories and clergy from around the state. In the afternoon, I spoke at a press conference on expanding Medicare. The afternoon was spent driving to Columbus for the Celebration of a New Ministry at St. Paul's with their

rector, Andrew McLarty. I drove home after the service.

Vienna comes to Natchez

A trio of cultural events, anchored by the Mississippi debut of a Mahler symphony, bring a taste of Austria to Trinity Episcopal Church

Three events tightly related to Vienna, Austria, will take place in May at Trinity Episcopal Church in Natchez.

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They are sponsored by the Natchez Festival of Music and Trinity Church. Two events are ticketed, and one is free of charge.

The Song of the Earth by Gustav Mahler, a symphony concert in six movements, will be presented for the first time in Mississippi at 7 p.m., Thurs., May 16, 2024, at Trinity Church. Tickets are \$30.

Mahler is famed in Vienna, where he lived and worked until his death in 1911.

Conducted by Dr. Jay Dean, Natchez Festival of Music Artistic Director, the concert will feature:

- Two vocalists, Jonathan Yarrington, tenor, and Myka Murphy, mezzo soprano;
- The Festival of Music Chamber Players, musicians from nationally known music companies;
- Ward Emling, former Director of the Mississippi Film Office, who will present the poetry that inspired the symphony;
- Projected images of original oil landscapes by Will Smith, Jr., of Natchez and New Orleans that relate to the theme of the concert.

Setting the stage for the concert will be two additional Vienna-related events at Trinity Church, to be held Thurs., May 9, a week before the concert.

First is a free lecture at 11 a.m., May 9, called "The Magical Music of Gustav Mahler." Presented by Trinity Church's Marion Smith Speaker Series, the program will be by Dr. Joseph E. Jones, musicologist at the University of Southern Mississippi School of Music.

He will discuss Vienna in the early 20th century, when Austria's artistic and literary elite came together. He will focus on Mahler, an intellectual and cultural giant whose style developed at the time.

Following the lecture, at 12 noon, May 9, in Trinity's Kuehnle Hall will be a ticketed luncheon called *Let's Visit Mahler's Vienna*.

Adding to the ambiance will be Austrian-inspired foods, Austrian flags and images of dancers performing the Viennese Waltz.

Tickets are \$20 and limited to 80 people.

Tickets to the luncheon May 9 and to the concert May 16 are available at natchezfestivalofmusic.com.

The concert benefits Trinity's organ restoration fund and the Festival of Music.



On Saturday, April 6, 2024, about 50 ladies (and a few men) gathered at St. Peter's By-the-Sea in Gulfport to hear the Rev. Patrick Sanders speak and to conduct the business of the diocesan ECW. Bishop Brian Seage was also in attendance for the final conference to be held under his episcopacy.

Five former ECW Board Presidents were in attendance: Mary Chaney, Mary Beth Welch, Brenda Hawkins, Lindsey Richard, & Mary Beth Burghard. President Martha Morgan presided with Interim Board Secretary Brenda Hawkins taking minutes. The group honored Darcy Strickland, Board secretary for many years, who passed into her next life in January of this year. Special memorials were made to the All Saints, Tupelo, breakfast ministry for unhoused persons called "Saints Brew" and our ECW Children at Risk fund. The 2023 financials were reviewed and the Outreach Funds distributions were noted. Reminders were given for the Providence IV Zoom meeting on June 1 and the dates of ECW Triennial/ Nat'l Convention, Louisville, KY, June 23-28. Our three delegates are President Martha Morgan, Pres-Elect Ann Milsted and Lollie Everett, 2024 Distinguished Woman of the year. The Fall 2024 conference is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, November 9, in a Jackson area church. The special speaker's name will be announced soon.

Rev. Sanders' talk was called *How Faith Becomes Joy* and focused on John the Disciple. This John wrote the New Testament book of John, the letters of John, and the Book of Revelation. His book is considered the earliest of the Gospels. And it stands out among the others as a more personal account of Jesus Christ's life.

St. Peter's By-the-Sea and Rev. Sanders held a closing service, preached by Bishop Seage. Their wonderful choir & its Choirmaster-Organist, J. T. Anglin, provided lovely music which filed the sanctuary.

In closing, a lovely buffet lunch was served by the local ECW hosts. During the meal Ann Milsted & Rev. Sanders suggested ideas for ECW fundraisers, including such fun-sounding activities as "Big-Mouth Bingo."

Endurance of the Spirit

Photographer and digital artist Carolyn Terry publishes book of photographs of Mississippi churches

Carolyn Terry, a parishioner of St. Paul's, Picayune, and an award-winning artist, found inspiration for her recent photos in the stories of rebuilding she found among the churches of the Diocese of Mississippi.

"I was so impressed after learning of the history of many that rebuilt after much destruction and disasters," she says.

Those photos are now the subject matter of her justreleased book, *The Endurance of the Spirit: Mississippi Episcopal Churches*.

Much of the rebuilding that inspired her happened in the aftermath of the Civil War, a theme she found while photographing the interiors of churches.

"Many of the stained-glass windows were installed not only to honor family members," says Terry, "but in the spirit of reconciliation after the Civil War to honor the dead from both North and South."

In some cases, however, that rebuilding process was all too present, like the one currently underway for the people of Chapel of the Cross, Rolling Fork, whose church was destroyed in a tornado last year. As Terry assembled the photos she took of 95 churches across the state for the book, she decided it only appropriate to donate a portion of the proceeds to that parish in its hour of need.

Bishop Brian Seage penned some remarks to celebrate the publication of *Endurance*.

"This book is a visual celebration of the spiritual heritage that resonates within the walls of these Episcopal churches," he says, "and it serves as a timeless tribute to the holy moments shared by the faithful throughout Mississippi."



Screating new ones are the goals of Community Lunches at St. Philip's Episcopal Church in Jackson.

The church, located at 5400 Old Canton Road, held its first Community Lunch March 22 with representatives from nearby homeowners' associations, Temple Beth Israel, Christ United Church, New Jerusalem Church, the Jackson Police Department and city and county officials.

"We've recently celebrated our 60th anniversary at St. Philip's Episcopal Church," says William Burke, the church's senior warden. "We've witnessed a lot of change in Jackson since we first purchased our property at Old Canton and Westbrook Road, and we see the needs of our community changing."
